Dear Friends

I want to take this opportunity on behalf of the whole congregation to welcome our friend Duncan Forsyth to Clackmannan Church. Duncan is a member of Tillicoultry Parish, and lives in Alloa, and he is with us for a few months as part of a process which will help him to discern a call to ministry in the Church of Scotland.

I thought that it might be helpful to explain why Duncan is with us so that you might know what his role is, and what his expectation may be of the possible outcomes which mark the end of his time with us.

For a number of years now the Church of Scotland has asked those who have expressed an interest in entering the ministry of the Church to embark on what is called the Enquiry and Assessment Scheme. As you will probably realise from its name this scheme has two parts, enquiry, and assessment. Currently Duncan is on the Enquiry phase which lasts a minimum of eight weeks and a maximum of six months.

During this enquiry period the 'Enquirer', Duncan in this case, is partnered with a congregation to experience the tasks and responsibilities of ministry and church life which will help him reflect on his own suitability for ministry, and on the nature of his call to serve God in a field of ministry in the Church of Scotland. My role at this time is two-fold, first to allow Duncan the opportunity to be as involved as he wants in worship or in the wider church life, and secondly to help him reflect on his call to ministry so he can make a decision whether or not to apply to the Church for consideration as a candidate for ministry.

After the minimum of eight weeks, should he decide that God may well be calling him to be a minister in the Church, Duncan can apply to be recognised as a candidate for ministry. He then becomes an 'Applicant' and is asked to move to the second phase of the Enquiry and Assessment Scheme, called the Co-ordinated Field Assessment. He can opt to do that in another church or stay here with us.

This Assessment period lasts around six months, and should Duncan opt to stay here then my role changes slightly. Although I am still to act as a facilitator, I am also responsible for assessing his suitability, along with others, to proceed to a national assessment conference, which I will say more about later.

While the Enquiry stage was 'enquirer-driven', that is to say, what Duncan wants to do, the Assessment stage will be more directed. Duncan will complete a Field Assessment Agreement which will set out a number of tasks which he will be expected to complete over the six months. Again these will be designed to give him experience and allow him, along with me, to reflect on his Call. At this time the Presbytery appoints a representative who will help in the formulating of the Agreement, and will meet with Duncan and me from time to time.


Towards the end of his time in the Assessment phase Duncan will attend a local review. This review is led by a national assessor from the Church of Scotland and will include me as local assessor and the Presbytery Representative. This review will discuss the Assessment period with Duncan. It is more of a conversation than an interview, but it is designed to help us make a decision on Duncan's suitability to be a candidate for the ministry of the Church.

The review will be able to make one of four decisions. Either

- 1 to allow the applicant (Duncan) to proceed to the National Assessment Conference, or
- 2 to ask the applicant to take a further period of Assessment before a decision is reached, or
- 3 not to allow the applicant to proceed at this time, but give permission to reapply after twelve months, or
- 4 not to allow the applicant to proceed at all.

That, of course, is several months in the future. For now Duncan is still in the initial enquiry stage. I would ask you to welcome him, either in church on Sundays, or to your organisation once it starts up again, or to your home should he come for a visit. Pray for him, so that he might find it easy to discern whether God is indeed calling him to ministry. I commend him to your prayers.

IGNITE—THE GATHERING

It is almost two months since our exhibition took place and we have just had

our “final” meeting of the Planning Group to review how the process has gone. Only 91 members of the congregation attended out of a possible attendance of 449 and we have received 173 Response Sheets.

It is disappointing that we have had so poor a response to our attempts to ensure that Clackmannan Parish Church has a more secure financial future. However, the encouraging news is that of the 173 people who have responded 136 have committed to increase their giving. There has also been an increased request for Standing Order and Gift Aid Forms.

There is an obvious shortfall in the return of the Response Sheets (for whatever reasons) and the Planning Group has decided that a copy of the Response Sheet should go out with ‘The Window’ so that if your form has been lost or misplaced then there is a second chance for you to complete the form. Once completed, place in an envelope and either hand it to your elder or hand it into the church. We hope you take this opportunity to respond to the needs of your church.

At the end of the service as is the custom here, we greet new visitors and show them good cheer. But I felt moved somehow and wanted to meet the shoe man so after the closing prayer I reached over and shook his hand.

He was old. His skin was dark and his hair was truly a mess, but I thanked him for coming, for being our guest. He said “My name is Charlie I’m glad to meet you my friend.” There were tears in his eyes but he had a large wide grin.

“Let me explain,” he said, wiping tears from his eyes. “I’ve been coming here for months and you are the first to say Hi. I know my appearance is not like the rest, but I really do try to always look my best. I always clean and polish my shoes before my very long walk but by the time I get here

they are dusty like chalk.”

My heart filled with pain and I swallowed to hide my tears as he continued to apologise for daring to sit so near. He said “When I get here I know I must look a sight but I thought if I could touch you our souls might unite.”

I was silent for a moment knowing whatever was said would pale in comparison I spoke from my heart not my head.

“Oh you’ve touched me,” I said “and taught me in part that the best of any man is what is found in his heart.”

The rest I thought this shoe man will never know Like just how thankful I really am that his dirty old shoe touched my soul.

A GREENLAND EXPERIENCE

One of our cruise ports of call was Nanortalik in Greenland. The name means “the place where polar bears go” referring to the polar bears that drift down with the pack ice from the east coast in spring.

It is Greenland’s most southerly town with a population of 1300 and it provided minimal opportunity to shop or engage in any of the usual tourist activities. However, the inhabitants did all they could to make the visitors from the cruise liner as welcome as possible.

As well as the open-air museum with traditional turf roofed houses and farm buildings, there was a folk dance performance by school children and a display of kayaking, including the Eskimo-roll, in the small harbour. However, the highlight for us was the performance by a Greenlandic choir of 13 in the blue and white painted church. The songs were sung in Inuit at a tempo reminiscent of a psalm in a Free Kirk in the West Highlands. An English translation was given for each of them and here is one printed exactly as it was produced ...

gregation in the Town Hall for a taste of the holiday club week.

The week was marked by a spirit of good fun and enthusiasm, and we are indebted to the team members who eagerly gave their time to run the club. We were delighted to have the help of Becky Kremer, a resi-



dent of Clackmannan, and member of Tillicoultry Baptist Church, as our Spy Chief. Policemen back on the beat.

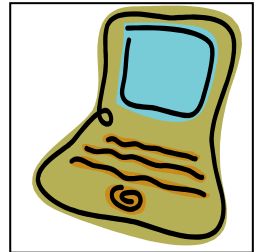
Is there anything else you think that the family of Clackmannan Parish Church should know about you?
